
CITIZEN AND YOUTH OF THE YEAR

COME WALK WITH US!

Submit your kilometres to the Village Office as we walk across Canada! We have made it to Johnston Canyon, just 30 minutes outside of Banff.

We are travelling the Trans Canada Highway. Here are some facts about the TCH that you probably didn't know:

To qualify as Trans-Canada Highway, the paved road must be at least 6.7 m wide with unpaved shoulders of at least another 3.3 m on either side. Hills cannot exceed six degrees of slope angle, and drivers must always be able to see at least 183 m down the road ahead. It took until 1971 for the full length of the road to be completed to this standard.

Council Corner

Recap from recent meetings:

- The Village and the 'Namgis FN sponsored Alert Bay DARE with \$470.00 for this year's program
- Council will be budgeting for upgrades at the transfer station to allow enough room for the new recycling program and reduce our costs when our garbage and recycling is picked up
- The Village Council is still looking for a ferry advisory committee member
- The Council has been reading a new Boat Harbour bylaw which will amend wording in regards to live-a-boards, and general usage of the harbour
- Council donated free bowling passes for the T'lisalagi'lakw School Valentine Dance
- Public Works will be upgrading the Village fleet
- The Alert Bay Lions Club requested to do some upgrades on the building at the airport
- The Seafest Society was a delegation at the February meeting to discuss plans for upgrades to Jubilee Park (Community Hall Field) which include an improved bandstand
- Colin Skinner came to the Council meeting to discuss plans around an improved museum
- The tree cutting permit for Remnant Lot 1 plan 1952 (Larch and Poplar) was approved
- Council submitted the following resolution to the Association for Van. Isle. Coastal Communities:

WHEREAS the Fukushima Daaichi Nuclear Disaster

occurred on March 11, 2011 resulting in the catastrophic failure of three nuclear reactors and associated fuel rod storage pools causing the release of significant amounts of radionuclide contamination into the atmospheric and marine environments. The owners of the Daiichi Facility (TEPCO) and the Japanese government, have not been able to contain the marine and atmospheric radionuclide contamination originating from the failed Fukushima Daiichi facility;

AND WHEREAS the 80% of British Columbians who live within 10 miles of the Pacific Ocean, as well as the wide variety of marine and coastal economic stakeholders who rely on ocean and coastal

environments deserve to have access to detailed information regarding possible radionuclide contamination associated with the Fukushima Daiichi Nuclear Disaster.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Association of Vancouver Island and Coastal Communities support those British Columbians who are affected by the Fukushima Daiichi Nuclear Disaster by calling on the Province of British Columbia and the Government of Canada to immediately enact the following:

- 1) Convene a panel of institutional and citizen scientists to determine what type and frequency of marine and atmospheric monitoring is required to maintain clear understanding of the environmental impacts of the Fukushima Daiichi Nuclear Disaster on coastal British Columbia:
- 2) Determine the locations where a comprehensive network of marine and terrestrial sensors or other monitoring methodologies will be maintained;
- 3) Commission a website that would both list the raw findings of sensor and environment testing and interpret these data in a clear and transparent manner;
- 4) Open negotiations directly with the government of Japan regarding both the accelerated containment of radionuclide contamination, and full financial support of the cost of the Fukushima Daiichi Nuclear Disaster Monitoring Program on the west coast of BC and Canada
