AUTUMN SAFETY & HEALTH



Walk safely

- Look. Always make eye contact with drivers. Never assume that a driver has seen you.
- Listen. Focus your full attention on what's happening around you. Remove
 your headphones and never talk, text, or use electronic devices while crossing
 the road.
- Dress to be seen. Wear reflective clothing or gear and flashlights to make it easier for drivers to see you.
- Be extra cautious at intersections. Watch for vehicles turning left or right through the crosswalk.
- Always cross at designated crosswalks, never mid-block. Follow pedestrian signs and traffic signals and never cross once the signal has turned yellow or red.

Drive safely

- Focus on the road, and stay off your phone or any other hand-held electronic devices while you're driving
- Be ready to yield to pedestrians, especially when turning in intersections and near transit stops.
- Look twice for pedestrians crossing the road, especially when visibility is poor,
- Give yourself extra time and space to stop in case a pedestrian suddenly crosses the street.

It's flu season! Get your flu shot at the Cormorant Island Community Health Centre November 4 & 5, 9:30am-4pm.

In Canada, thousands of people are hospitalized and many die from influenza every year. Populations at higher risk include young children, pregnant women and elderly people. Immunize BC recommends that everyone 6 months and older
