LITTERLESS LUNCH!



Litterless lunches are the best for your **Kids**, your **pocketbook**, <u>and</u> the **planet**!

Now that the kids are back in school, why not give litterless lunches a try? Litterless lunches reduce packaging waste and are usually healthier and cheaper. Avoiding packaged lunches could litter-ally save you hundreds of dollars a year!

LITTERLESS LUNCH (water bottle, sandwich, yogurt, fruit)	A PACKAGED LUNCH (juice box, Lunchables, Yo-Tube, fruit chews)
\$2.65 / average day	\$4.02 / average day
\$13.25 / week	\$20.10 / week
\$477.00 / school year	\$723.60 / school year

The average student lunch generates 66 lbs of waste per school year. That would mean almost 5000 lbs each of unnecessary waste for the Alert Bay School and the T'lisalagi'lakw School.

REUSABLE lunch carrier	NO paper or plastic bags
REUSABLE containers (Tupperware, Rubbermaid, Lockables)	NO plastic wrap, foil, wax or Styrofoam
REUSABLE drink bottle or thermos	NO single-use cans or juice boxes
CLOTH NAPKIN to wash and re-use	NO paper napkins
SILVERWARE to wash and re-use	NO plastic forks/spoons
HEALTHFUL snacks	NO overly packaged/processed snacks

It can be difficult to make the switch all at once. Try changing one of your snacks to a litterless snack, or try one litterless day a week!
